




I would like to say a few words on the publication of NARASHINO & BRISBANE 20TH ANNIVERSARY.

The City of Narashino and Brisbane City Council had signed the agreement in recognition of the importance of protecting wetlands and the migratory shorebirds which depend upon the wetlands of both cities on February 25, 1998. Since then, we have deepened exchanges mainly by citizens from both cities operate in the Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Center (YNOC) and Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre (BWEC).

This year (2018) ,marks the 20th anniversary of the exchange, which is the result of the enthusiasm and efforts of the people involved in the exchange, and I would like to express my deep respect and gratitude as a representative of Narashino City.

Since the previous plan has expired, I visited Brisbane in February, 2017 to renew our Action Plan based on our Wetland Partnership Agreement.

By exchanging opinions directly with people involved in the conservation of the Boondall Wetlands, I have learned a lot about what we need to need to do in order to conserve wetlands and the international cooperation associated with the protection of migratory shorebirds.

It was also a very valuable experience to see each other's wetlands and talk about what we know, and I realized that this would be an irreplaceable experience in this exchange.

This booklet will introduce the history of Yatsu Higata (tidal flat) and the Boondall Wetland, the difference between them, as well as the history of our exchange. A lot of photographs of the exchange are posted. If you take a look at it, you should be able to sympathize not only with the need for activism, but also with the many people involved in the preservation of their respective wetlands and the local wetlands.



Mayor's foreword

Since 1998 Brisbane City Council has been a signatory to the Wetlands Affiliation Agreement with the City of Narashino, Japan. The Agreement seeks to promote the understanding, protection, and conservation of the Yatsu Higata Tidelands and Brisbane's Boondall Wetlands.

The Yatsu Higata Tidelands and Boondall Wetlands provide a critical habitat for migratory bird species crossing the East Asian-Australasian Flyway.

This Agreement is a response to a List of Wetlands of International Importance under the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands listing, which supports the protection of wetlands and their resources.

The first Wetlands Affiliation Agreement was finalised on 25 February 1998. Since this time, two further agreements have been successfully completed with the fourth agreement successfully signed in February 2017, during a visit by the Mayor of Narashino.

I am pleased to say that for this agreement, both Brisbane and Narashino have agreed to ongoing actions that will see the continued preservation and conservation of these vitally important wetlands.

In 2016, the 20th Anniversary of the opening of the Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre was celebrated. For this special occasion Brisbane was honoured to host delegates from Narashino.

Brisbane City Council is currently in the early design stages of building a new environment centre in Boondall, which is part of Council's commitment to keeping Brisbane clean, green and sustainable and making our city liveable and sustainable for our children, and their children to follow. The new centre will either replace or adjoin the existing Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre Building. The new centre will showcase the ecological significance and values of Brisbane's northern wetlands and their connection with Moreton Bay. It will showcase the unique flora and fauna that use the wetlands and the importance that wetlands play in coastal management. It will include features that inspire wonder and curiosity and encourage visitors to get out and enjoy the natural environment.

These wetlands are home to a wide variety of native bird life inhabiting its tidal flats, mangroves and open forests. The Boondall wetlands offer habitats for over 190 species



of birds, including:

- black-shouldered and brahminy kites, Australian kestrels and ospreys
- whimbrels, godwits, plovers, tattlers, sandpipers and curlews on the mudflats
- ducks, egrets, herons and cormorants foraging within the wetlands
- kingfishers in the mangrove forest
- rainbow bee-eaters on the mangrove boardwalk.

Migratory shorebirds from around the world feed on the food-rich mud flats and roost in the salt marshes and mangroves along the shoreline. Each spring they fly to Moreton Bay from as far as Siberia, China, Mongolia, Alaska, and of course Japan. Large numbers of international migratory shorebirds travel between Narashino and Moreton Bay each year, and they usually reside in the Boondall Wetlands between the months of September and March.

With the recent signing of the fourth Wetlands Affiliation Agreement between our two cities, I look forward to continuing to work with our partners in Narashino as we carry on protecting our valuable wetland ecosystems for future generations.

Celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the Relationship with Brisbane

My sincere congratulations on the 20th anniversary of the relationship with Brisbane City. Our school is located on the opposite shore from Yatsu-Higata Nature Observation Center. We opened in 1986 as the sixteenth elementary school of the city and marked 32 years this year.

At Yatsu Higata that extends in front of our school, many migratory shorebirds visit every year. These birds go back and forth between Australia to Japan and Japan to Siberia. In other words, the environment is not just for one country.

Yatsu Minami Elementary School has had an active relationship with Brisbane City. Looking at the sources left at school, we have found out that the relationship began in 1998. We even found documents indicating there were not just letter exchanges but online interaction with some schools in Brisbane. However, they became slightly out of touch after events such as the 2011 earthquake.

Fortunately, the relationship was reestablished two years ago and we have invited the staff in Brisbane City over to our school which gave us a chance to spend some fun time with the children. These exchanges have been fun moments to remember for the children at our school.

I wish that Yatsu Minami Elementary School continues to play the role of connecting Narashino City and Brisbane City just like the migratory shorebirds.

Bond Between the Wetlands Deepened by Birds

Wild Bird Society of Japan Chiba President Hideo Shimura

We, Wild Bird Society of Japan Chiba Prefecture, are in support of the affiliation agreement for "conservation of wetlands and protection of migratory shorebirds" established between Narashino City and Brisbane City in 1998 and have done birdwatching, observed bird banding, and hosted symposia together with Queensland Wader Study Group (QWSG) based in Brisbane during our visits there in 2002 and 2005.

A member of QWSG conducted birdwatching and a seminar in Japan in 2006, and a member of our society held a seminar in Brisbane City in 2008. Since this series of projects, we have deepened our relationship and in 2010, together we developed a joint project "Survey of migration routes of Grey-tailed Tattler using a geolocator" and resulted in success in 2016 after seven years of local work. This joint project is the embodiment of the "conservation of wetlands and protection of migratory shorebirds" and the fruit of the affiliation. I sincerely hope that we, as a bird conservation organization, continue to contribute to the relationship.



Through sharing of ideas and resources we have developed numerous educational programs and materials. The 'wings of the world' program is a fine example of an educational program delivered to local schools which incorporates a 'Kamishibai' storying telling technique and the story of Tom the Red-necked Stint, gifted to us by Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Centre.

Through our relationship, we have held numerous community events such as World Wetland Day, Family Fun Days, and on many occasions staff and volunteers from Yatsu Higata have facilitated activities at these events. More recently we have promoted the agreement and the value of wetlands and shorebirds through the BrisAsia festival, Brisbane's annual Japanese cultural day and other culture festivals and events.

The agreement has also helped bring people together in Brisbane. We have worked closely and formed productive partnerships with various organisations such as the Queensland Wader Study Group, Port of Brisbane, Wildlife Protection Society of Queensland, Moreton Bay Marine Parks, and Nudgee Beach Environmental Education Centre. Together with these partners, we have created a Sharing Shorelines DVD and Kiosk, mobile interactive Sharing Shorelines display, and our shorebird Mascot Ellie the Eastern Curlew.

The wetland exchanges between the cities have also had a profound effect on the Boondall Wetlands staff and volunteers who have found the passion, commitment and creativity at Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Centre extremely inspiring and moving.

Looking after these special birds that call both of our wetlands home, is a task which requires international collaboration and action. This unique agreement leads the way and demonstrates how international effort can be organised to support efforts across the globe, and something we should both take pride in. From the start the QWSG has been aware that the only way we can enhance the knowledge of waders and aid in their protection is by international co-operation. To this end the joint activities of the Queensland Wader Study Group and the Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Centre (YNOC) have been a great success and each new venture is eagerly awaited by all of the QWSG members.

Seeing how the Japanese group goes about educating the local people has been an inspiration to us here in Australia and we can only hope to achieve the level of junior volunteer participation that we have seen at YNOC. The junior ranger program has the potential to have a constant influx of very motivated adults in the future protecting the waders that visit both of our shores.

The QWSG has an active program of banding, flagging and using satellite transmitters. This has and in the future will give us all a vast amount of new information about the movements of the wonderful migratory birds that we all love so much. We have recently gained knowledge about the movements of Pacific Golden Plover both in their local sphere but also their international migratory routes. This will help to protect their feeding and roosting sites in the Brisbane area, but also sheds light on the international importance of various stop-overs, including those in Japan.

This work is expensive and we wish to thank most sincerely the co-operation and help that we have received from YNOC. This shows how we can work across boundaries to help species that know no such artificial constraints, but are affected by our decisions large and small.

One of the things that can be lost in the celebration at high level is the personal exchanges that take place and I know that everyone from the QWSG who has visited Narashino City Council and the YNOC has made contacts that we wish to continue for ever.


East Asian-Australasian Shorebird Reserve Network

East Asian-Australasian Shorebird Reserve Network (EAASRN) is a multilateral network for a maintenance of shorebirds site.

The most important wetlands as breeding grounds, wintering grounds and stopovers for the shorebirds which move the longest distance , join the Network.

Both Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands also take part in it.

Now it is taken over by East Asian-Australasian Flyway Partnership. (EAAFP)

Narashino City and Brisbane City

Let's compare the two cities.

The birth of Narashino City

In 1889, five villages (Yatsu, Kuguta, Saginuma, Fujisaki and Okuboshinden) were merged and 'Tsudanuma Village' was born. After that it became Tsudanuma Town. And the area of Mimomi and Yashiki became a part of Makuhari Village.

In 1873 a part of Koganemaki became an army training ground and it named 'Narashinohara' by Meiji Emperor. So Narashino City was born after merging a part of Chiba City.

Features of Narashino City 1


Narashino city is located in northwest part of Chiba prefecture. It borders Chiba City, Funabashi City and Yachiyo City and faces Tokyo Bay.

It has the fourth smallest land area. It is really a compact city but the population density is the third highest in Chiba prefecture.

Along Tokyo Bay area, houses on reclaimed land and factories are spread. There is a large height difference with inland of natural terrain.



Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands

Yatsu Higata

Area 40 hectares

Overview

Yatsu Higata is located in the innermost part of Tokyo Bay and is a rectangular tidal flat. It lies between houses and roads. In it, the tides ebb and flow and the highest sea surface reach about 1 m depth.





※Boondall Wetlands is a part of Moreton Bay registered under the Ramsar Convention.

Overview

Boondall Wetlands is located on the edge of Moreton Bay, about 15 km north of Brisbane's CBD. It lies on tidal flats, mangroves and grasslands, forests and so on.





Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands

< Yatsu Higata >

Yatsu Higata is a part of the beach-front tidal flat that once existed in the inner part of Tokyo Bay and became what is left today by the local conservation work in the midst of active reclamation of the areas around in 1970s.

A concrete wall surrounds the tidal flat and residential, commercial, and industrial areas extend nearby. The two creeks at both ends connects the flat with Tokyo Bay and brings in the ebb and flow of the tide.

Moreover, Yatsu Higata is in the flyway of some migratory shorebirds and a Ramsar site as well as a member of East Asian-Australasian Flyway Partnership.



Yatsu Higata used to be a site for salt manufacturing taking advantage of the ebb and flow on the shallow beach until around 1911. However, it was converted into Yatsu Amusement Park after the salt manufacturing closed down as a result of multiple storms.

Yatsu Amusement Park, consist of zoo, rose garden, and many game and rides served as a popular entertainment facility until it closed in 1982.



Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands



Reclamation of the adjacent sea areas has begun in 1971, and protest by the local community against the construction and projects followed.

Thanks to the movement for the conservation by the local community, the reclamation plan was scratched and Yatsu Higata was able to be kept intact as a precious natural heritage located in the middle of a city.





Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands

In 1988, the Environmental Agency (today's Ministry of the Environment) designated Yatsu Higata (41.2 ha.) as a National Wildlife Protection Area and the majority (40.1 ha.) as a Special Protection Area.

Later in 1993, Yatsu Higata became a Ramsar site and the first tidal flat in the country to be one.

Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Center opened next year as a facility for observing wild birds and learning about environment.

It is equipped with an observation deck that allows a landscape view of Yatsu Higata as well as a lecture room where screenings take place and the rangers (staff) and volunteers provide a guided tour for the visitors.



Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands



City of Narashino determined 10th of June, the date Yatsu Higata was designated as a Ramsar site, “Yatsu Higata Day” for the purpose of raising conservational awareness of the precious natural heritage and sharing information.

Events are held on Yatsu Higata Day and many people gather over year.

In addition every year, about a month before and after Yatsu Higata Day began to be called “Yatsu Higata Day Festival” since 2016 and various events are hosted during this period.

At Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Center, we also hold events around World Wetlands Day on 2nd of February every year. We welcome many visitors at these occasions.




Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands

There has been a trend that indicates the decline of the population of migratory shorebirds that come to Yatsu Higata compared to when it was designed a Ramsar site.

The declining number of dunlin, which come to Yatsu Higata in good numbers, has led to the declining number of sandpipers. Especially, the population of plovers has decreased noticeably and still is.

Each individual needs to take an interest in and work on the conservation of wetlands and protection of migratory shorebirds in order to stop the further decline of the bird population of those come to Yatsu Higata.

< Boondall Wetlands >

Boondall Wetlands are located on the edge of Moreton Bay, about 15 km north of Brisbane's CBD. It lies on tidal flats, mangroves and grasslands, forests and so on. It is the largest remaining wetland in Brisbane and has been registered under the Ramsar Convention as an important stopover and wintering ground for migratory birds. Boondall is an indigenous (Aboriginal) word meaning plants in primeval rainforests.



In 1976, the Mayor of Brisbane purchased lands in Boondall Wetlands for a large-scale canal development, but the plan was put on hold due to a redevelopment of an international airport. In 1985, a new city plan reclaiming Boondall Wetlands has been announced.



Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands



Conservation groups were formed to oppose the plan. Their strong opposition movement stopped the plan, and in 1990 a protection of Boondall Wetlands declared. Later, Boondall Wetlands Management Board was established to protect and manage the wetlands, and the Boondall Wetlands Management Plan was announced in 1992.

With the cooperation of many people, Boondall Wetlands were protected, and on October 22, 1993, Moreton Bay including Boondall Wetlands was registered under the Ramsar Convention.



Yatsu Higata and Boondall Wetlands

In Boondall Wetlands, you can experience walking, cycling, fishing, canoeing, picnics, and so on.

Many people enjoy birding during September to March when migratory birds come.

In 1996, Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre was open to the public to allow visitors to learn and explore the natural environment. At Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre they conduct survey of environment, you can view environmental and cultural displays, and also you can be guided by staff of volunteers.



Many events are held on February 2, which is "World Wetlands Day". It is a good opportunity to reconsider wetlands and many people join the events every year.





Story behind our Relationship

It all started at the Eighth Consultative Meeting of Japan-Australia Migratory Bird Agreement in 1995. City of Narashino and Brisbane City Council started to exchange since then.

In spite of differences of language and culture of Japan and Australia, feelings for wetlands and migratory birds are the same, and we have worked with international cooperation to preserve wetlands and protect migratory birds.

<Migratory shorebirds and Wetlands>

Yatsu Higata is located on the **East Asian-Australian Flyway**.

Among migratory birds, most of the water birds, especially sandpipers and plovers **breed around Siberia and Alaska**. After the breeding season, they fly across Pacific Ocean to their **wintering place** such as East Asia, Australia or New Zealand. **Boondall Wetlands** is one of the wintering places and welcome those travelers every year.

The East Asian-Australian Flyway runs approximately 10,000km from north to south, which means migratory shorebirds need to fly 20,000km every year. Therefore, **Yatsu Higata**, as well as other wetlands, is a **vital wetland for migratory birds to eat and rest**.

<Designation of Ramsar Site>

Yatsu Higata became a Ramsar site on **June 10, 1993** since it is important for migratory shorebirds.

Approximately four months later, **Morton Bay** including Boondall Wetlands in Brisbane was added to Ramsar site on **October 22, 1993**.

<Beginning of Wetland Exchange>

Australia Government suggested Japan Government having relationships between two countries at **8th consultative meeting of Japan-Australia Migratory Bird Agreement** in June, 1995.

Kushiro Wetlands in Hokkaido and Kooragang Wetlands in Australia have had relationships at this time, so relation of **Narashino and Brisbane is the second case** of that **between Japan and Australia**.



History

<City of Narashino's Vision>

Considering the suggestion from Ministry of Environment of Japan, City of Narashino decided to start wetland exchanges, judging that "**International recognition and cooperation is necessary to protect migratory birds flying across national borders to Yatsu Higata.**"

City of Narashino proposed exchanges with Boondall Wetlands because of the **many similarities** with the Yatsu Higata, such as the fact that it became a Ramsar site in the same year, the escape from landfill by the citizen movement, and the participation of citizens in the conservation of wetlands.

After discussions and inspections, City of Narashino and Brisbane City Council **concluded Affiliation Agreement on February 25, 1998.**

1. Survey and exchange of information on wetland conservation and migratory bird conservation.
2. Support exchange programme for the replacement of staff involved in the conservation of wetlands.
3. Support children's exchange to raise awareness and understanding of nature conservation.
4. Enlighten conservation of wetlands and the protection of migratory birds both domestic and international.
5. Support citizen's exchange visits.

BACKGROUND

Wetlands are one of the most important global environments valued for their biological diversity and high productivity. Despite recognition of the importance of various functions of wetlands for human society, the loss, destruction, degradation and misuse of wetlands continues in many areas of the world. In light of the ever-increasing pressure on wetlands, and in order to implement the conservation of wetlands and protection of migratory shorebirds through the involvement of the citizens of our two cities, an Affiliation Agreement was finalised on 25 February 1998. The agreement was supported by the First and Second Five-Year Plans that have now been successfully completed.

Representatives of Brisbane and Narashino have agreed on creating a Third Five-Year Plan with new actions to respond to increasing concern and awareness of both cities and their citizens regarding the conservation of wetlands and the protection of migratory shorebirds.


Looking back on these 20 years, you can fully understand that Narashino City and Brisbane City have had well enough exchange



Wetlands are one of the most important global environments to be valued because of their biological diversity and high productivity. Despite recognition of the importance of various functions of wetlands for human society, loss, destruction, degradation and misuse of wetlands continue in many areas of the world.

Given the ever increasing pressure on wetlands, it is essential that local government and its local communities promote wetland conservation to maintain these delicate and fragile environments and to restore global wetlands to a pristine condition so that they may be passed on from generation to generation.

The East Asian-Australasian Shorebird Reserve Network was approved and inaugurated at the Sixth Meeting of the Conference of the Contracting Parties to the Ramsar Convention held in Brisbane City in March 1996. This network suggests that cooperation between each country involved and collaboration between the wetlands is important for the preservation of wetlands and the protection of migratory shorebirds. Furthermore, Recommendation 6.3, adopted at the Sixth Ramsar Convention calls for the consideration of how local people should participate in the preservation of wetlands.

Brisbane City (Queensland, Australia) and Narashino City (Chiba Prefecture, Japan) support internationally important wetlands, including those registered under the Ramsar Convention and wetlands forming part of the East Asian-Australasian Shorebird Reserve Network. Both cities will strive to preserve their own wetlands and protect waterbirds. In addition, both cities are aware of the importance of working together with the local community to protect wetlands and have a deep understanding of the significance of projects for the preservation of those wetlands being undertaken in a sister wetland relationship.


In recognition of the importance of protecting wetlands and the migratory shorebirds which depend upon these wetlands, the City of Narashino and the City of Brisbane have reached the following agreement to:

1. Support joint research and the exchange of research and study information in relation to wetland preservation and the protection of migratory shorebirds.







The agreement was supported by the First and Second Five-Year Plans that have now been successfully completed.

Representatives of Brisbane and Narashino have agreed on creating a Third Five-Year Plan with new actions to respond to increasing concern and awareness of both cities and their citizens regarding the conservation of wetlands and the protection of migratory shorebirds.

STRATEGIES AND ACTIONS

Strategy 1

"Raise awareness, understanding and appreciation of migratory shorebirds and wetlands with the intention of encouraging environmentally aware behaviours."

Actions

1. Support environmental education through the centres' activities and programs.
2. Develop partnerships with local primary schools to support understanding and positive behaviour to conserve migratory shorebirds and wetlands and sharing of information and materials.
3. Promote understanding of the Ramsar convention and its objectives.
4. Brisbane and Narashino will hold an annual event (e.g. World Wetlands Day celebration in Brisbane and Yatsu Higata Day in Narashino) to raise awareness of wetland and shorebird conservation and to celebrate the environmental achievements of volunteers and staff in protecting wetlands, shorebirds and implementing the agreement. At each event there will be:
 - formal mention of the agreement
 - a display promoting the agreement and current activities
 - an activity to engage participants in the relationship
 - a memento/keepsake from the event to send to the other city's environment centre for display (e.g. video, guestbook, report, artwork, photos).
5. Cooperate with cities that have wetlands on the East Asian Australasian Flyway network by sharing information and providing support as requested.
6. Develop, maintain and update displays at Boondall Wetland Environment Centre (BWEC) and Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Centre (YHNOC) specific to migratory shorebirds and wetlands and rotate these through centres or facilities in both countries. The displays may:

Strategy 2

"Support the exchange of information in relation to wetland conservation and the protection of migratory shorebirds at Boondall Wetlands and Yatsu Higata Tidelands."

Actions

1. Exchange relevant research, information and or resources on topics such as:
 - migratory shorebirds
 - wetlands
 - flora and fauna at Boondall Wetlands and Yatsu Higata Tidelands
 - habitat restoration/ bushcare
 - environmental programs
 - the impact of human activities on the above
 - methods of public education and interpretation
 - staff or volunteer training programs / manuals for BWEC and YHNOG (to share ideas on how to train and develop the skills of staff and volunteers)
 - monthly newsletters (i.e. the *Glider Gazette* and *The Birders*).
2. Investigate and support in principle opportunities to share projects and experiences in migratory shorebirds and wetland conservation.
3. Investigate the feasibility of video conferencing between YHNOG and BWEC (i.e. the ability to have live web exchange as part of the educational programs). This could facilitate experiential learning, create a stronger impression on participants and allow greater connection between the cities.

Strategy 3

"Maintain and enhance the relationship between Brisbane and Narashino's stakeholders to foster conservation of migratory shorebirds and wetlands".

Actions

1. Seek to participate in regular exchange visits to support the agreement's strategies, preferably in accordance with the following guidelines:
 - a. Formal visits (i.e. Mayors, Councillors, Council staff)
 - once every two years for each city
 - support in arranging itinerary and activities by host city


- b. Informal visits (i.e. volunteers)
 - once every two years (preferably in conjunction with formal visit)

 4. Enhance relations between BWEC and YHNOC and their associated community volunteers and groups.

2. Funding is conditioned on normal annual budget approval processes.



2. Support the exchange of research and information and activities by government and non-government organisations such as Japan Wild Bird Association in Chiba Prefecture and Queensland Wader Study Group, Queensland.



STRATEGY 2

“Support staff and volunteers to ensure they are effective advocates for the environment, wetlands and shorebirds within the wider community.”

ACTIONS

1. Support the training of staff and volunteers at BWEC and YHNOC to ensure they understand the agreement and the importance of protecting migratory shorebirds and their habitat.
2. Support staff and volunteers in BWEC and YHNOC and their activities by:
 - development and delivery of environmental programs for schools and the general public
 - publishing newsletters and communication materials
 - program promotion and communications relating to the agreement
 - promoting voluntary work at YHNOC and BWEC.
3. Support BWEC and YHNOC volunteers and groups associated with the agreement to build stronger networking and relationships.

STRATEGY 3

“Support the conservation of wetlands and protection of migratory shorebirds by engaging stakeholders and community both internally and externally around the international agreement”.

ACTIONS

1. Promote the importance of wetlands and migratory shorebirds through the programs delivered by BWEC and YHNOC in partnership with stakeholders.
2. Agree to provide web pages that will acknowledge the agreement, provide links to agreement partner websites, continue to raise awareness of issues facing the survival of migratory shorebirds and promote participation in organised activities.
3. Undertake strategies and actions to limit interference with shorebirds and their habitats.
4. Hold an annual event or a series of smaller events to raise awareness of wetland and shorebird conservation. These events will principally include the provision and promotion of:
 - the Ramsar convention, formal mention of this agreement and its objectives
 - information on the migratory shorebirds of Boondall Wetlands and Yatsu Higata Tidelands
 - a schedule of activities the community can participate in
 - information and graphics on the East Asian-Australasian Flyway used by the migratory shorebirds between Boondall Wetlands and the Yatsu Higata Tidelands.

A memento/keepsake from the event will be sent to the other city's environment centre for display (e.g. video, guestbook, report, artwork, photos).
5. Develop, maintain and update displays at BWEC and YHNOC specific to migratory shorebirds and wetlands and rotate these through centres or facilities in both countries.
6. Regularly communicate and share observation records with local schools and other community members.



Affiliation Agreement

STRATEGY 4

"Maintain and enhance the relationship between Brisbane, Narashino and other international stakeholders to foster the conservation of migratory shorebirds and wetlands".


ACTIONS

1. Seek to participate in regular exchange visits and communications to support the agreement's strategies. Preferably in accordance with the following guidelines.
 - a. Both cities support voluntary visits by centre staff, volunteers and citizens from groups involved in the agreement. Visits are not mandatory and will depend on funding and support from current administration. In case regular exchange visits are not possible, either city will provide advice to the other party for alternative programs. If visits are not possible, the exchange of information can be facilitated by internet appointments (i.e. Skype).
 - b. Via the use of social media and the web, provide opportunities for staff, school students and citizens to connect and participate in dialog about the protection of wetlands and migratory shorebirds.
 - c. Cooperate with cities that have wetlands on the East Asian-Australasian Flyway network by sharing information and providing support as requested.

ADMINISTRATION ARRANGEMENTS

1. Monitoring will be based on confirmation that each action has been achieved.
2. Reports will be exchanged every three years sharing achievements and outlining actions for the following three years.
3. Funding is conditioned on normal annual budget approval processes.
4. The long-term affiliation agreement will continue up until a time one of the parties requires a change to the arrangement. When a change is required the relevant party will propose alternative agreement details.

This Long-Term Plan for the Affiliation Agreement is agreed to in the spirit of mutual cooperation between the people of Brisbane and Narashino and to confirm their endorsement both Mayors hereby inscribe their signatures.

June 10, 1993	Yatsu Higata was designated as a Ramsar Site at COP5. COP5:Kushiro city Hokkaido
Oct. 22, 1993	Moreton Bay including Boondall Wetlands was designated a Ramsar Site.
July 1, 1994	Yatsu Higata Nature Observation Center (YNOC) opened.
June 27, 1995	The Australian Government suggested to Japan having a second cooperating-relation between wetlands, following Kushiro Wetlands and Kooragang Wetlands at the eighth consultative meeting of Japan-Australia Migratory Bird Agreement. Kushiro Wetland and Coolagang Wetland have already engaged in wetland exchange.
July 19, 1995	Ministry of the Environment of Japan sounded out City of Narashino out about the suggestion from Australia.
Feb. 24, 1996	Representatives from Australia (Four members including the head of Department of Environment and Conservation) visited Narashino City to inspect Yatsu Higata and talked with the mayor of Narashino. City official responded that they would consider after attending COP6 held at Brisbane.
Mar. 16, 1996	Boondall Wetlands Environment Centre opened.
Mar. 22-27, 1996	The delegation from Japan attended COP6 and the launch ceremony of East Asian-Australasian Shorebird Reserve Network. Inspected Boondall Wetlands and discussed affiliation between wetlands.
Nov. 13-16, 1996	The mission including Deputy Mayor of Brisbane visited Narashino to attend Local Government Exchange Seminar held in Japan. They inspected YNOC and City of Narashino entrusted them an official letter to Mayor of Brisbane City.
May. 15-17, 1997	The delegation including Deputy Mayor of Brisbane visited Narashino and handled a formal letter from Mayor of Brisbane.
June 8, 1997	Yatsu Higata Day was established.
Nov. 5-9, 1997	The manager of the Environment department of Narashino official and the Chief of YNOC visited Brisbane.
Feb. 23-27, 1998	The Mayor of Narashino and some members had a visitation to Brisbane. Affiliation Agreement was signed on 25th Feb.
June 5-10, 1998	Councillors from Brisbane visited Narashino to discuss and establish The First Five-Year Plan for Affiliation Agreement.
July 17, 1998	The Deputy Mayor and some members visited at Narashino and discussed about the First Five-Year Plan.
Jan. 9-16, 1999	The Chief of YNOC and some staffs went to Brisbane to consult on The First Five-Year Plan for Affiliation Agreement. They also held a bird carving class and experienced paddling canoes and wetlands-conservation works.



Mar. 4, 1999	The First Five-Year Plan for Affiliation Agreement between City of Narashino and Brisbane City Council was signed by email.
Sep. 16, 1999	Officials from the Australian Government came to Narashino and inspected Yatsu Higata.
Jan. 8-15, 2000	The head of YNOC visited Brisbane and experienced conservation of wetlands.
June 9-12, 2000	Staffs from City of Brisbane visited Narashino. They participated Yatsu Higata Day events. A ceremony which enlights the launch of Children's Waterfowl Network was held. Bird carvings were made by school children of Brisbane and Narashino and they were sent to 25 wetlands in the world with their messages.
June 8-13, 2001	Councillors and others from Brisbane visited Narashino and joined Yatsu Higata Day event, and discussed about Children's Waterfowl Network.
Sep. 28 - Oct. 3, 2001	Volunteers from YNOC visited Brisbane to hold bird carving and origami (Japanese traditional art of paper folding) lessons. They also attended a benthos survey and offered flowers at the monument of Anne Beasley.
Feb.2, 2002	Anne Beasley's Lookout opened.
Mar. 21, 2002	Professor Itayama from the University of Tsukuba visited Brisbane and surveyed water and mud quality in Boondall Wetlands.
June 8-10, 2002	Councillors from Brisbane came to Narashino on Yatsu Higata Day and visited Yatsu-minami Elementary School. Education Cooperation Memorandum (Draft) was signed.
Aug. 28-29, 2002	Brisbane City Councillors visited Narashino and requested the attendance to the Asian-Pacific City Summit in Brisbane which was scheduled in 2003.
Nov. 8-14, 2002	Wild Bird Society of Japan Chiba visited Brisbane and took part in banding survey conducted by QWSG.
June 5-9, 2003	Councillors from Brisbane attended Yatsu Higata Day events and discussed the Second Five-Year Plan for Affiliation Agreement.
Oct. 19-23, 2003	Mayor, Chairperson of City Council and others from Narashino visited Brisbane and attended the Asia-Pacific City Summit. The Second Five-Year Plan for Affiliation Agreement and Education Cooperation Memorandum were signed.
June 1-7, 2004	City Councillors from Brisbane came to Narashino and celebrated Yatsu Higata Day and the 50th anniversary of Narashino's municipality. They inspected some facilities of the city. Local schools in Brisbane and Narashino interacted online.
July 29-Aug.1, 2004	The former Mayor of Brisbane came on a visit to the Mayor of Narashino and inspected Yatsu Higata.

Feb. 1-6, 2008	The head of YNOC and others visited Brisbane and run some events at the festival of World Wetlands Day.
